

# Kath And Kim Series 2

The dynamic between Brett and Kim – the put-upon husband versus the narcissistic wife – becomes a central comedic engine in **Kath And Kim Series 2**.

## EPISODE GUIDE: HIGHLIGHTS OF SERIES 2

## Episode 1: “The Wedding”

The episode is a masterclass in social satire, poking fun at modern parenting and competitive mothers.

## Episode 3: “The Nightie”

One of the most iconic episodes of the entire series. Kath buys a “sexy” nightie to spice up her marriage, but Kim finds it and thinks it’s for her. The misunderstandings escalate, leading to a hilarious confrontation. The episode also features Brett’s disastrous attempt to cook dinner, resulting in the infamous line: “I’m not into cooking, Kim.” The writing is razor-sharp, and the physical comedy is superb.

## Episode 4: “The Bachelors”

Kel’s nephew, a professional football player (the “bachelor” of the title), visits and Sharon immediately falls for him. Kim tries to meddle, with predictably disastrous results. This episode showcases Szubanski’s comedic genius as Sharon’s hopeless romanticism collides with reality. It also gives Kel a chance to bond with his nephew, adding a touch of heart to the chaos.

## Episode 5: “The Holiday”

The family goes on holiday to a beach resort. Naturally, everything goes wrong. Kath tries to relax, but Kim complains constantly. Brett gets sunburnt. Sharon tags along and ends up in a disastrous speed-dating event. The episode is a wonderful escape and a reminder that, no matter where they

go, the characters take their dysfunction with them.

## Episode 6: “The Caravan”

In a classic sitcom trope, the family buys a caravan. Chaos ensues when they try to take it for a trip. This episode leans heavily into physical comedy and misunderstandings, with Kim insisting on being the “boss” of the caravan trip while knowing nothing about driving or towing. The episode is a fan favourite for its sheer ridiculousness.

## Episode 7: “The Pain”

A more subdued episode focusing on Kath’s health. She develops a mysterious pain in her side, leading to fears of a serious illness. Kim, surprisingly, shows a softer side – though she still manages to make it about herself. The episode balances genuine emotion with the show’s signature humour, proving **Kath And Kim Series 2** could handle deeper themes without losing its comedic edge.

## ICONIC CATCHPHRASES AND QUOTES FROM SERIES 2

## CULTURAL IMPACT: WHY SERIES 2 RESONATES

When **Kath And Kim Series 2** aired, it drew record ratings for the Australian Broadcasting Corporation (ABC). The show quickly became a cultural phenomenon. Why? ## CHARACTER DEVELOPMENT IN SERIES 2

One of the strongest aspects of **Kath And Kim Series 2** is how the characters grow (or, in some cases, stubbornly refuse to grow).

## Kath Day-Knight

In Series 2, Kath is more confident. She is newly married to Kel and determined to be a “modern” wife and mother. She experiments with self-help, tries to become more assertive, and even dabbles in a brief flirtation with a younger man (though she quickly realises her mistake). Kath’s journey is about finding balance between being a mother and being a woman in her own right. Jane Turner plays her with such warmth that even when Kath is being naïve, we root for her.

## Kim Craig

Kim remains as self-centred as ever, but Series 2 gives her more moments of vulnerability. Her fear of being left behind by Kath, her anxiety about being a good mother (though she fails spectacularly), and her desperate need for external validation are all on display. Gina Riley makes Kim both insufferable and oddly lovable. In **Kath And Kim Series 2**, we see why Kath puts up with her:

because deep down, Kim is still a little girl desperate for her mother’s approval.

## Sharon Strzelecki

Sharon’s role expands significantly. She becomes Kim’s sounding board, her partner in crime, and the emotional heart of many episodes. Her unrequited love for Brett (which is hinted at but never fully explored) adds a tragicomic layer. Magda Szubanski’s performance is brilliant; she can make a simple line like “I’ve got a cyst” hilarious and heartbreaking simultaneously.

## Brett Craig

Brett is more than just the punchline. In Series 2, we see his frustrations with his marriage, his

attempts to provide for his family, and his genuine fondness for Kath (his mother-in-law). Peter Rowsthorn brings a resigned dignity to the role. Brett may be mocked, but he is never mean-spirited. He is the everyman caught in the tornado of Kim’s whims.

### PRODUCTION AND WRITING EXCELLENCE

The success of **Kath And Kim Series 2** owes much to the tight writing and production. Riley and Turner wrote every episode themselves, ensuring consistency of voice. They were heavily involved in the editing process, and the show’s distinctive look – with its pastel colours, over-decorated sets, and costumes that are both glamorous and tacky – was carefully designed.

## Guest Stars
