It also promotes feelings of fullness, which can aid in weight management. Aim for 25-30 grams of fiber per day from a variety of plant sources.

3. Include Lean Protein at Every Meal

Protein has a minimal effect on blood sugar and helps slow down the digestion of carbohydrates, further stabilizing glucose levels. It also promotes satiety, keeping you feeling full and satisfied between meals. Excellent protein sources for a Type 2 Diabetic Diet Plan include:

- Skinless poultry and fish (especially fatty fish like salmon, mackerel, and

sardines rich in omega-3s)

- Eggs
- Tofu and tempeh
- Legumes (which also provide carbs and fiber)
- Nuts and seeds (in moderation, as they are also high in healthy fats)
- Low-fat dairy products (Greek yogurt, cottage cheese)

4. Embrace Healthy Fats

Dietary fat, particularly unsaturated fat, is essential for heart health, which is especially important for people with

3. **Fill one quarter of your plate** with complex carbohydrates or starchy vegetables (e.g.,

quinoa, brown rice, sweet potato, beans).

FOODS TO EMPHASIZE AND FOODS TO LIMIT

Building your daily menu around these foods makes following a Type 2 Diabetic Diet Plan straightforward and delicious.

Your "Go-To" Foods (Eat Freely)

- **Non-starchy vegetables:**
Spinach, kale,

lettuce, cucumbers, tomatoes, bell peppers, broccoli, cauliflower, zucchini, asparagus, mushrooms, onions.

- **Whole fruits (in moderation):**

Berries (strawberries, blueberries, raspberries), apples, pears, citrus fruits, plums. Pair with a protein or healthy fat to blunt the blood sugar response.

- **Legumes:**
Lentils,

Skinless chicken or turkey, fish, shellfish, eggs, tofu, low-fat Greek yogurt, cottage cheese.

- **Healthy fats:**

Avocado, olives, olive oil, nuts, seeds, nut butters (no added sugar).

- **Herbs, spices, and**

condiments:

Cinnamon, turmeric, garlic, ginger, vinegar, mustard, most herbs.

Limit or Avoid (Eat Sparingly or Never)

- **Sugary**

beverages:

Soda, sweet tea, fruit juice, energy drinks, sports drinks. These are the single largest source of added sugar for many people and cause massive blood sugar spikes.

- **Refined carbohydrates:**

White bread, white rice, regular pasta, crackers, chips, pretzels.

Foods to

- **Sugary treats and desserts:**

Candy, cake, cookies, ice cream, pastries, syrup, honey, agave nectar.

- **Processed meats and full-fat dairy:**

Bacon, sausage, hot dogs, regular cheese, whole milk, cream.

(Can be consumed in very small amounts if part of a balanced plan, but often high in saturated fat and sodium).

- **Fried foods and trans fats:**

Commercially fried items, margarine, many processed snacks. Trans fats are particularly harmful for heart

health.

- **High-sodium foods:**

Many canned soups, processed snacks, soy sauce, and frozen dinners. High sodium can worsen blood pressure, a common concern in diabetes.

SAMPLE DAY TO INSPIRE YOUR TYPE 2 DIABETIC DIET PLAN

This is just a sample to show how the principles can come together. Adjust portions based on your individual needs, hunger levels, and activity.
