

How To Brew Luwak Coffee

ESSENTIAL EQUIPMENT FOR BREWING LUWAK

COFFEE

THE GOLDEN RULES FOR BREWING LUWAK COFFEE

1. **Water temperature:** Keep it between 88°C and 93°C (190°F to 200°F). Boiling water will scorch the delicate beans and bring out unwanted bitterness.
2. **Grind size:** Medium-fine is the sweet spot for most methods. Too fine, and you risk over-extraction; too coarse, and the coffee will taste weak and sour.
3. **Coffee-to-water ratio:** A good starting point is 1 gram of coffee to 16 grams of water (a 1:16 ratio). Adjust to taste—Luwak is often best at a slightly lower ratio (1:15) to enhance its body without overpowering the palate.
4. **Do not over-extract:** Luwak coffee's charm lies in its smoothness. Steep for less time than you would with a standard dark roast. Over-extraction brings out the very bitterness the civet process removed.
5. **Pre-warm your vessel:** Rinse your brewer, carafe, or cup with hot water before brewing. This stabilizes the temperature during extraction.

METHOD 1: POUR-OVER (MANUAL DRIP)

Pour-over brewing is widely considered the best method for showcasing the nuanced flavors of Luwak coffee. It allows for precise control over water flow and extraction time. Here is **how to brew Luwak coffee** using a pour-over setup such as a V60 or Chemex:

Step-by-Step Pour-Over

Instructions

- **Step 1:** Boil your filtered water and let it cool to about 90°C. While waiting, place a paper filter in your dripper and rinse it with hot water. This removes paper taste and warms the brewer.
- **Step 2:** Weigh out 15 to 18 grams of whole Luwak beans. Grind them to a medium-fine consistency, similar to table salt. Freshness is paramount—grind immediately before brewing.
- **Step 3:** Add the grounds to the filter and gently shake to level the bed. Start your timer and pour a small amount of water—about twice the weight of the coffee—over the grounds to bloom them. Let it sit for 30 to 35 seconds. The bloom releases trapped carbon dioxide and prepares the grounds for extraction.
- **Step 4:** Continue pouring water in a slow, circular motion, starting from the center and moving outward. Maintain a steady, gentle stream. Pour until you reach the desired water weight (for 15g coffee, aim for around 240g water).
- **Step 5:** Let the water drain through. The total brew time should be between 2 minutes 30 seconds and 3 minutes. If it takes much longer, your grind is too fine; if it finishes too quickly, your grind is too coarse.
- **Step 6:** Swirl the carafe gently to mix the brew, then pour into a pre-warmed cup. Allow the coffee to cool slightly before tasting to appreciate the full range of flavors.

The pour-over method highlights the clean, bright acidity and the subtle fruity notes that make Luwak coffee so distinctive.

METHOD 2: FRENCH PRESS

The French press delivers a fuller body and richer mouthfeel, which can complement Luwak coffee's naturally creamy texture. However, because the French press uses immersion brewing, it is easier to over-extract. Follow this guide for **how to brew Luwak coffee** in a French press:

Step-by-Step French Press Instructions

- **Step 1:** Heat your water to 90°C. Preheat the French press by rinsing it with hot water.
- **Step 2:** Weigh out 15 grams of whole Luwak beans. Grind them to a coarse consistency—slightly larger than sea salt. A fine grind will slip through the mesh filter and make the cup muddy.
- **Step 3:** Add the grounds to the French press and pour in 240 grams of hot water. Stir gently with a wooden or plastic spoon (avoid metal, which can affect taste) to ensure all grounds are saturated.
- **Step 4:** Place the lid on with the plunger pulled up. Steep for exactly 4 minutes. Do not skip this timing—Luwak coffee becomes bitter if left too long.
- **Step 5:** Press the plunger down slowly and evenly. Do not force it. Once pressed, pour the coffee immediately into

your cup. If you leave it in the press, it will continue to extract and turn bitter.

- **Step 6:** Let the coffee cool for a minute before drinking. The French press will bring out deep chocolate notes and a velvety mouthfeel.

METHOD 3: ESPRESSO (FOR THE ADVENTUROUS)

Brewing Luwak coffee as espresso requires careful calibration because the coffee's low acidity and unique sugars can behave differently under pressure. If you want to try **how to brew Luwak coffee** as espresso, follow these guidelines:

- Use a fine grind, but not as fine as you would for a standard espresso. Luwak beans are delicate and can choke your machine if ground too fine.
- Use 18 grams of coffee for a double shot. Tamp lightly with even pressure.
- Pull the shot at around 90°C to 92°C. The extraction time should be 25 to 30 seconds. Watch for a steady, golden-brown stream.
- Expect a shot that is surprisingly smooth, with little to no bitterness. It will taste almost syrupy, with notes of dark chocolate and molasses.

Espresso preparation is not the most forgiving method for Luwak, but it can produce an extraordinary, concentrated experience.

GRIND SIZE AND EXTRACTION: A QUICK REFERENCE

Dialing in the correct grind size is arguably the most critical variable when learning **how to brew Luwak coffee**. Here is a simple guide:

Brew Method	Grind Size	Brew Time
Pour-Over (V60/Chemex)	Medium-fine	2:30–3:00 min
French Press	Coarse	4:00 min
Espresso	Fine (but not powder)	25–30 sec
AeroPress	Medium	1:30–2:00 min

Always adjust grind size based on taste. If your coffee tastes sour or weak, grind finer. If it tastes bitter or harsh, grind coarser and reduce brew time.

COMMON MISTAKES TO AVOID
