The eighth book, *The Wind Through the Keyhole*, was published later as a midquel, fitting chronologically between books four and five. Each volume expands the world, deepens the mythology, and pushes Roland closer to his ultimate goal.

THE CORE CAST: ROLAND AND HIS KA-TET

No discussion of **Stephen King The Dark Tower** is complete without meeting its unforgettable characters. The series begins with Roland alone, but by the second book, he begins to "draw" companions from our world into his quest. - **Oy:** A billy-bumbler, a raccoon-dog-like creature who joins the ka-tet. He is loyal, brave, and speaks in single words. Oy is one of the most beloved characters in all of King's work.

It condensed the entire series into a 95-minute runtime, effectively acting as a sequel rather than an adaptation. MAJOR THEMES: KA, THE TOWER, AND REDEMPTION
