Brake fluid should be flushed every two years, especially if you track your car. DOT 4 fluid is recommended for high-heat conditions. Coolant replacement intervals vary by generation, but a 5-year or 100,000-mile interval is a good baseline for modern Corvettes.

Tire Care and Pressure Monitoring

Corvettes are sensitive to tire pressure. Running low pressure can cause excessive heat buildup and reduce grip, while overinflation leads to a harsh ride and uneven wear. Invest in a quality tire pressure gauge and check pressures when the tires are cold. The recommended pressures are usually found on a sticker inside the driver's door jamb. For summer-only tires, be aware that driving in temperatures below 40°F (4°C) can cause cracking. If you live in a colder climate, consider a set of all-season or winter tires on a separate set of wheels. Wheel alignment is another often-overlooked item. A proper alignment tailored to your driving style can extend tire life significantly.

Battery Maintenance and Storage

Corvettes, especially modern ones with complex electronics, are hard on batteries. If you plan to store your car for more than two weeks, connect a battery tender. The parasitic drain from computers, alarms, and active fuel management systems can kill

A "column lock" issue can sometimes be traced back to a weak battery. A simple trickle charger can save you hundreds of dollars in diagnostic fees. When storing your Corvette for winter or long periods, fill the gas tank to prevent moisture condensation, add a fuel stabilizer, and inflate the tires to the maximum pressure listed on the sidewall to prevent flat spots.

PERFORMANCE DRIVING AND TRACK PREPARATION

Getting the Most Out of Your Corvette on the Road

Driving a Corvette well requires practice. Start by learning the limits of your car in a safe environment, such as an autocross event or a track day with an instructor.
