

Army Asu Uniform Setup Guide

4. Secure the Shoulder Loops and Sleeves

SETTING UP THE ASU TROUSERS AND SKIRT

The lower half of the uniform must match the coat in fit and cleanliness. Trousers should be pressed with a sharp crease down the front of each leg. The length should break slightly over the top of the shoe. For skirts, the hemline should fall at or just below the knee. Both trousers and skirts are worn with a black belt that has a brass buckle for enlisted personnel and a gold buckle for officers.

Footwear and Socks

Black leather oxford shoes are the standard for the ASU. They must be polished to a mirror shine, with no scuffs or dirt. Socks should be black and calf-length, made of a material that stays up without sagging. For female soldiers wearing pumps, the heel height should be between 1/2 inch and 3 inches, and the shoes should be free of decorative elements.

HEADGEAR AND ACCESSORIES

Headgear is a critical part of the uniform and must be worn correctly at all times. The service cap features a visor and a band, with a distinctive insignia plate on the front. The beret is worn pulled to the right, with the flash and stiffener positioned over the left eye. Both options require careful shaping to achieve the proper look.

Neck Tab and Tie

Enlisted soldiers wear a black neck tab that fastens at the collar. The tab must be centered and snug, with no gaps. Officers wear a four-in-hand tie, tied in a Windsor or half-Windsor knot. The tie should reach the middle of the belt buckle and be free of wrinkles. Both options require a clean, pressed shirt collar that sits flat against the neck.
