This two-part play script, written by Jack Thorne based on a story by J.K. Rowling, John Tiffany, and Thorne, tells the story

of Harry's youngest son, Albus Severus Potter, who struggles with his family legacy. It is often considered the eighth

canonical story, though its canonicity is debated among fans. It is best read after the original seven books.
