KEY MUSICAL THEMES IN THE PLANES SOUNDTRACK

The Hero’s Theme

THE ROLE OF MUSIC IN THE FILM

Mancina uses music to cue the audience into character emotions, signal plot turns, and build the world of the film. For example, the transition from the rural, open-sounding music of Dusty’s home to the brass-heavy, competitive music of the racing world highlights the protagonist’s cultural shift. Additionally, the use of silence in certain key moments (such as after the crash) makes the subsequent musical returns all the more powerful. Mancina’s score proves that in animation, music is not just a background element but a primary storytelling tool.

COMPARING THE PLANES SOUNDTRACK TO OTHER DISNEY SCORES
