The name "Nurse Shark" may come from the sucking sound it makes when feeding, which resembles a nursing baby, or from an old, archaic word for "nusse," meaning "cat shark." While they are slow-moving and generally not aggressive, they can deliver a powerful bite if provoked.

The Nudibranch: The Ocean's Most Colorful Slug

These are soft-bodied, marine gastropod mollusks, essentially sea slugs, that have shed their shells after their larval stage.
