She is a powerful force of ambition in the early acts of the play. When Macbeth returns to his castle at

Inverness, Lady Macbeth convinces him to murder Duncan that very night.

## Act II: The Murder of King Duncan and the Descent into Guilt

## Act V: The Fall of Lady Macbeth,

## the Armies Arrive, and the Final Battle

Macduff reveals that he was "untimely ripp'd" from his mother's womb (born by caesarean section), making him not "of woman born" in the natural sense. Macbeth realizes he is doomed. Macduff kills him, cuts off his head, and presents it to Malcolm.

Malcolm is declared the rightful king of Scotland, restoring order to the kingdom.
