What your 3rd grader needs to know in math includes a strong grasp of number sense and the ability to move quickly between different operations. Core expectations include:

SCIENCE AND SOCIAL STUDIES: EXPANDING THE WORLDVIEW

The content areas become more structured and content-rich in third grade. What your 3rd grader needs to know in science and social studies goes beyond simple observation. They are expected to make connections between concepts and understand cause and effect.

Science: The focus is often on three main areas: physical science, life science, and earth science. Key topics include:
