Other risky condiments include ketchup, mustard, barbecue sauce, salad dressings, and marinades that use malt vinegar, wheat thickeners, or natural flavorings. Always read labels or choose certified gluten-free brands.

## Beverages

Beer and ale are typically brewed with barley and are not gluten-free. However, there are many gluten-free beers made from sorghum, rice, or corn. Wine and distilled spirits are generally gluten-free, but some liqueurs and flavored alcoholic beverages may contain malt. Coffee and tea are naturally gluten-free, but flavored coffee syrups and instant coffee mixes can sometimes contain gluten. Always check the label.
