## **Scarcity**

Scarcity is the single most powerful factor. Early pressings, especially those from the Sun Records era (1954-1955), are inherently rare because they were produced in relatively small quantities. Similarly, promotional copies, test pressings, and records that were withdrawn or had limited distribution command higher prices. Elvis's first single, "That's All Right" on Sun 209, is famously scarce in any condition. The fewer copies that survived in good shape, the higher the premium.

Condition is everything in the vinyl market. Collectors rely on a standardized grading system: Mint (M), Near Mint (NM), Very Good Plus (VG+), Very Good (VG), Good (G), and Poor (P). A record graded Mint or Near Mint can be worth ten times more than the same title in Good condition. For **Elvis Presley records price guide** purposes, always inspect the vinyl for scratches, warps, and groove wear, as well as the sleeve for ring wear, seam splits, and writing. A pristine copy of a common album like “Elvis’ Christmas Album” can fetch \$100+, while a beat-up

## Label Variations and Pressing Plants

Elvis’s records were issued on several labels: Sun, RCA Victor (with multiple label designs), and later RCA’s various subsidiaries. Even within RCA, early 1950s “Dog on the Nipper” labels differ from later “RCA Victor” black labels, or the “Camden” budget reissue labels. Collectors pay close attention to label color, text font, and the depth of the grooves. For example, the first

pressing of “Elvis Presley” (RCA LPM-1254) features a maroon label with silver print, which is more valuable than the later black label reissues.

## Mono vs. Stereo and First Pressings

Before 1968, many Elvis albums were recorded and mixed in mono, with stereo versions being either rechanneled or later true stereo mixes. Mono pressings of albums from the 1950s and early 1960s are often considered more authentic and are typically more valuable than the early stereo

copies. First pressings – those from the initial release run – always carry a premium over reissues. The catalog number, matrix number etched in the dead wax, and cover artwork details help identify a first pressing.

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While thousands of different Elvis records exist, a select few are legendary among collectors. These are the high-end items that can command thousands of dollars at auction or private sale. # Sun Records Singles (1954-1955)

- **“That’s All Right” / “Blue Moon of Kentucky” (Sun 209)** – The very first Elvis single. A copy in Near Mint condition can fetch between **\$5,000 and \$15,000**, depending on the exact pressing variant (e.g., the earlier “hillbilly” version vs. later pressings). Even a VG copy might bring \$2,000.

## Rare Promotional and Specialty Items

- **“The Elvis Presley Story” (RCA Victor PC-1397) - A 1960s promo EP box set -** Very rare, especially with all inserts. Prices can hit **\$1,000-\$2,000.**
- **Test pressings and acetate**

**discs** - Unique items often made for radio. They can range from **\$500 to \$5,000+** depending on content and condition.

- **“Pot Luck” (RCA LPM-2523) - Early 1960s -** Not extremely rare, but first pressings in NM with the “RCA Victor” black label can still be worth **\$200-\$400.**

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### **MID-RANGE AND COMMON RECORDS WITH COLLECTIBLE POTENTIAL**

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Not every Elvis record is a goldmine, but many are still highly collectible and

maintain steady value. Understanding which albums and singles fall into the mid-range can help you build a valuable collection without breaking the bank.

## 1960s and 1970s RCA Albums

Albums like *"G.I. Blues"*, *"Blue Hawaii"*, *"Elvis Is Back!"*, and *"From Elvis in Memphis"* are popular. First pressings in mono or early stereo can range from **\$50 to \$300** in NM condition. Later reissues are common and often under \$20. The key is

to look for original labels and covers without damage.

## 1968 Comebac k Special LP and Later Releases

The *"'68 Comeback Special"* soundtrack (RCA LSP-4158) is a sought-after title, especially the original quadraphonic version. Values can reach **\$100-\$300** in NM. Albums from the 1970s such as *"Moody Blue"* (the last studio album) are valued more for their rarity in sealed or pristine condition - a

sealed copy can be **\$100-\$200**.

## 45 RPM Singles and Extended Plays (EPs)

Elvis's 45s are abundant, but certain ones are valuable, especially those with picture sleeves in excellent condition. Early RCA 45s from the 1950s (e.g., "Heartbreak Hotel," "Hound Dog," "Don't Be Cruel") with original picture sleeves can be worth **\$50-\$200** each. Promotional copies with "Recorded for

Radio" or "Not for Sale" markings often double or triple the value. Early EPs like "*Elvis Presley*" (EPA-992) and "*Elvis Vol. 1*" (EPA-940) can fetch **\$100-\$400** in NM.

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### HOW TO GRADE AND AUTHENTICATE ELVIS RECORDS

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Accurate grading is crucial to buying or selling at fair prices. Use the following guidelines when examining a record:

## Grading the Vinyl

- **Mint (M):**  
Perfect condition, no visible defects, plays without noise. Essentially a

sealed record.

- **Near Mint (NM):** Minimal wear, maybe a slight scuff, but plays perfectly. Cover is close to new.
- **Very Good Plus (VG+):** Light surface scratches that may produce minor crackles but not affect music enjoyment. Sleeve has some ring wear.
- **Very Good (VG):** Noticeable scratches, some background noise, but still playable. Sleeve may have seam splits or writing.
- **Good (G):** Heavy wear, significant noise, skips possible. Sleeve is worn and creased.

- **Poor (P):** Unplayable or heavily damaged.

## Authenticating Label and Pressing Details

Check the label for the correct font, color, and catalog number. Use online resources like Discogs or the “Elvis Records Price Guide” books to confirm the exact pressing. Look for the stamped or etched numbers in the runout groove. Many original pressings have specific identifiers such as “I” or “A” stamps indicating the pressing

plant. Counterfeit Elvis records exist, especially for Sun singles, so compare with images from trusted collector forums.
