- How does the council's decision to send Despereaux to the dungeon reflect the values of their society?

- What role does guilt play in Roscuro's journey? Does he feel responsible for what happened?
- Why does the king ban soup and rats from the castle? What does this decision tell us

about fear?

Chapters 18–20: The Rat and the Princess

- How does Roscuro's plan to capture Princess Pea begin to take shape? What motivates him?
- What does the character of Botticelli add to the story? How does he manipulate Roscuro?
- **Compare Despereaux and Roscuro at this point in the story.** How

are their journeys similar or different?

Chapters 31–34: The Descent into Darkness

- How does Despereaux prepare for his journey into the dungeon? What does he take with him, and

why? **31–40)**

- **What role does hope play in Despereaux's quest?** How does he maintain hope in such a dark place?
- Why does Princess Pea feel both fear and curiosity when she first sees Roscuro again?
- How does the author use light and dark imagery in these chapters to reflect the characters' emotions?

Chapters 35–37: The

Confrontation

- What does Despereaux say to Roscuro that changes the rat's perspective? Why do words have such power in this scene?
- How does Miggery Sow react when she sees Princess Pea in danger? Does she redeem herself?
- Why does Princess Pea forgive Roscuro? What does this moment teach us about compassion?
- **Describe the turning point of the story.** Is it a single event, or a series of

choices?

Chapters 38–40: The Return to Light

- How does the story resolve for each main character? Does everyone get what they deserve?
- What is the meaning of the title "Recalled to the Light"? Who is recalled, and how?
- Why does the narrator remind us that "stories are light"? What is the author

saying about the act of storytelling?

- How does the final scene with the king and the bowl of soup bring the story full circle?

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS FOR DEEPER ANALYSIS

Beyond chapter-specific questions, these broader discussion prompts encourage students to synthesize themes across the entire novel.

- **How does Kate DiCamillo use the motif of soup throughout the story?** What does soup represent at different points in the book?
- Compare the

three main characters: Despereaux, Roscuro, and Miggery Sow. How does each one define bravery? How do their definitions evolve?

- Why does the narrator frequently address the reader directly? How does this narrative style affect your reading experience?
- What is the role of forgiveness in the story? Which characters forgive, and why is forgiveness difficult for some?
- How does the book define "happiness"? Does each

character find happiness by the end?

HOW TO USE THESE COMPREHENSION QUESTIONS EFFECTIVELY
