Problem 2: Using Phenotype Frequency to Find Allele Frequency

Scenario: A rare recessive genetic disorder affects 1 in 1600 newborns in a large population. Assuming Hardy-Weinberg equilibrium, what is the frequency of the disease-causing allele (recessive) and the carrier (heterozygote) frequency?

Solution:

1. **Identify q^2 :** The recessive phenotype frequency = $q^2 = 1/1600 = 0.000625$.
2. **Calculate q :** $q = \sqrt{0.000625} = 0.025$.
3. **Calculate p :** $p = 1 - q = 1 - 0.025 = 0.975$.
4. **Calculate carrier frequency:** $2pq = 2 \times 0.975 \times 0.025 = 0.04875$, or about 4.875% of the population.

Answer: $q = 0.025$, carrier frequency = 0.04875 (approximately 1 in 20.5 individuals).

Problem 3: Testing for Equilibrium With Observed Data

Scenario: In a population of 200 plants, 90 have red flowers (RR), 60 have pink flowers (Rr), and 50 have white flowers (rr). Determine if the population is in Hardy-Weinberg equilibrium.

Solution:

1. **Calculate observed genotype frequencies:** $RR = 90/200 = 0.45$, $Rr = 60/200 = 0.30$, $rr = 50/200 = 0.25$.
2. **Calculate allele frequencies:** Total alleles = 400. R alleles: from RR: 180, from Rr: 60 = 240; $p = 240/400 = 0.6$. r alleles: from rr: 100, from Rr: 60 = 160; $q = 160/400 = 0.4$.
3. **Calculate expected frequencies under equilibrium:** $p^2 = 0.36$, $2pq = 0.48$, $q^2 = 0.16$. Multiply by 200: expected RR = 72, expected Rr = 96, expected rr = 32.
4. **Compare observed vs. expected:** Observed: 90 RR, 60 Rr, 50 rr. Clearly different from expected (72, 96, 32). The population is **not** in equilibrium.

Answer: $p = 0.6$, $q = 0.4$. The population deviates from Hardy-Weinberg equilibrium, suggesting selection, non-random mating, or other factors.
