line with versatile backups who can play multiple positions. A player who can play both guard and tackle is extremely valuable. On defense, look for a young linebacker with good speed or a developmental safety. By this point, you should have a clear idea of your team's strengths and weaknesses. Key Positions to

Target and Avoid
