COMPLETE EPISODE GUIDE FOR CHICAGO FIRE SEASON 2

Episode 1: “A Problem House”

The season premiere opens with the firefighters of Firehouse 51 responding to a massive warehouse fire. Severide is still grappling with the death of his close friend from the previous season, and tensions mount when a new squad member arrives. Casey continues to navigate his complicated relationship with Dawson. The episode sets a dark, intense tone for the season while introducing the key themes of guilt, loyalty, and resilience.

Severide receives an ultimatum from Chief Boden regarding his investigation, and Mills reveals a surprising talent that earns him a spot on Truck 81. The episode is a tense, fast-paced rescue drama with strong character moments.

Episode 7: “No Regrets”

Dawson’s brother Antonio, now a detective, asks her help with a case involving a missing girl. The investigation leads the firehouse to a dangerous drug den. Shay considers a major life decision regarding her relationship, and Casey must decide whether to leave the firehouse for a lucrative private sector job. The title “No Regrets” underscores the episode’s exploration of difficult choices.

Episode 8: “Rhymes with Shout”

A series of fires at a retirement home point to a possible serial arsonist. Mills and Dawson grow closer after working together on a medical call, causing tension with Casey. Episode 14: “When It All Goes Wrong”

A balcony collapse traps several people, including one of the firehouse’s own. Casey must decide whether to bend the rules to save a life. Mills receives news that his father’s death may have been connected to a firehouse incident years ago. The episode deepens the season’s mystery elements while delivering a gripping rescue sequence.

Episode 15: “Let It Burn”

An arsonist targets a church, and the fire crew struggles to save the historic building. Mills shares his discovery about his father with Casey, who offers him guidance. Episode 18: “One Right Thing”

After the blackout, the team deals with its aftermath, including a building collapse that leaves people trapped. Mills learns the full truth about his father’s death and must decide whether to tell his mother. Severide begins a new relationship that complicates his professional life. The episode focuses on doing the right thing even when it’s painful.

Episode 19: “A Little Guy, a Little Trouble”

A young boy is trapped in a sewer pipe, and the crew must use unconventional methods to save him. Dawson and Casey go on their first official date, but the evening is interrupted by an emergency.
