TIPS FOR PARENTS: SUPPORTING**PREP**

You are your child's greatest advocate and coach. Here are some practical strategies to make the preparation process smooth and effective.

Create a Consistent Study Routine

Set aside a specific time each day for test prep. Short, regular sessions (20-30 minutes) are more effective than long, irregular cramming sessions. Consistency builds habit and reduces resistance.

Use Positive Language

Avoid phrases like “You have to pass this test” or “This is very important.” Instead, say “Let’s practice together so you feel ready” or “This is a fun way to see what you know.” Frame test prep as a game or challenge rather than a chore.

Incorporate Real-World Learning
