Commutative, Associative, and Distributive Properties

- **Associative Property:** The grouping of numbers does not change the sum or product. For example, $(2 + 3) + 4 = 2 + (3 + 4)$ and $(5 \times 6) \times 2 = 5 \times (6 \times 2)$.
- **Distributive Property:** This is a powerful tool: $a(b + c) = ab + ac$. It lets you multiply a term across a sum. For instance, $3(x + 4) = 3x + 12$. You will use this frequently when simplifying expressions and solving equations.

3. **Sign errors in solving equations.** For example, solving $x - 5 = -3$. Add 5 to both sides: $x = 2$. But some students mistakenly write $x = -8$.
4. **Misapplying properties.** The commutative property works only for addition and multiplication, not subtraction or division. Also, the distributive property must multiply the outside term by every term inside the parentheses.
5. **Not checking solutions.** Always substitute your answer back into the original equation. This simple step catches errors immediately.
