- **High-Sugar**

- **Legumes:**

Beans, lentils, chickpeas, and peanuts (technically a legume).

- **Processed Vegetable Oils:** Soybean, corn, sunflower, and canola oils are often highly processed and can be inflammatory.
- **Low-Fat and Diet Products:** These are often loaded with added sugars and artificial ingredients to compensate for the lack of fat.
