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## UNDERSTANDING PRIME FACTORIZATION: THE BUILDING BLOCKS OF NUMBERS

# Alternative Factor Pairs

You might have chosen a different starting pair when you began your factor tree. For instance, you might have started with 3 and 14, since 3 times 14 equals 42. The number 3 is prime, but 14 is composite. You would then break 14 into 2 and 7, both of which are prime. Again, you arrive at the same set of prime factors: 2, 3, and 7. Alternatively, you could start with 2 and 21. The number 2 is prime, and 21 breaks into 3 and 7. No matter which path you take, the final set of prime factors is always the same. This consistency is a

beautiful property of mathematics and confirms the uniqueness of prime factorization.

It is important to note the order of the factors does not matter in multiplication. Whether you write  $2 \times 3 \times 7$ ,  $3 \times 7 \times 2$ , or  $7 \times 2 \times 3$ , the product is always 42. However, it is conventional to list the factors in ascending order from smallest to largest. This standard practice makes it easier to compare factorizations of different numbers and to identify common factors quickly.

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## WHY PRIME FACTORIZATION MATTERS

smallest number that both 42 and 56 divide into evenly.

Similarly, prime factorization makes it easy to find the least common multiple of numbers. The LCM is the smallest number that is a multiple of two or more numbers. To find the LCM of 42 and 56 using prime factors, you take each prime factor that appears in either factorization, using the highest exponent. For 42, we have 2, 3, and 7. For 56, we have  $2^3$  and 7. The highest power of 2 is  $2^3$  (which is 8), the highest power of 3 is  $3^1$ , and the highest power of 7 is  $7^1$ . The LCM is  $8 \times 3 \times 7$ , which equals 168. This means 168 is the

Prime factorization is also a powerful tool for simplifying fractions. Suppose you have the fraction  $42/56$ . By writing both the numerator and denominator in their prime factor forms, you can easily see and cancel common factors. The fraction becomes  $(2 \times 3 \times 7) / (2 \times 2 \times 2 \times 7)$ . Cancel the common factors of 2 and 7, and you are left with  $3 / (2 \times 2)$ , which simplifies to  $3/4$ . This method ensures you always reduce fractions to their

simplest form without making errors.

For instance, since the prime factors are all distinct (no prime is repeated), 42 is called a squarefree number. Squarefree numbers have applications in number theory and algebra.

The eight divisors of 42 are 1, 2, 3, 6, 7, 14, 21, and 42. Knowing the prime factorization makes it easy to list all divisors systematically.

The prime factorization also helps us understand why 42 is a polite number meaning it can be expressed as the sum of two or more consecutive integers. For example, 42
