## Step-by-Step Moulage Process

1. **Prepare the Dress Form:** Ensure the form is set to the correct measurements. Mark key reference points such as the center front, center back, bust

point, waistline, and hip line using twill tape or a marker.

2. **Cut and Align the Fabric:** Start with a piece of muslin large enough to cover the area you are draping. Fold or mark the fabric's grainline (the direction of the threads) and align it with the center front or center back of the form.
3. **Secure the Fabric:** Pin the fabric along the center line, then smooth it outward. For a bodice, begin at the shoulder and neckline, pinning to the form. Allow enough ease for movement but keep the fabric taut.
4. **Shape and Drape:** Gently manipulate the fabric to follow the curves of the form. Create darts,

tucks, or pleats where needed to accommodate the bust, waist, or shoulder blades. Pin each adjustment carefully.

5. **Mark the Seam Lines:** Using a pencil or marker, trace the neckline, armholes, side seams, and any design lines directly onto the muslin. Be precise, as these lines will form the pattern.
6. **Remove and True the Pattern:** Unpin the muslin from the form and lay it flat. Use a ruler and curve template to smooth out the marked lines, ensuring all seam allowances are equal. This step is called "truing" and is critical for a professional finish.
7. **Create the Final Pattern:** Transfer the trued muslin onto

pattern paper, adding seam allowances (usually 1.5 cm or 5/8 inch) and notches for matching pieces. This becomes the master pattern for cutting the final fabric.

For symmetrical garments, drape only one half of the body (e.g., the right side) and then mirror the pattern. This saves time and ensures balance. For asymmetrical designs, you may need to drape the full form.
