Every brand is slightly different, so check the package instructions. Once cooked, drain the pearls and rinse them with cold water to remove excess starch. Place them in a bowl and cover them with a simple brown sugar or honey syrup. This keeps them sweet, flavorful, and prevents them from sticking together.

Step 3: Assemble the Drink

Now comes the fun part. Take a tall glass and add your sweetened tapioca pearls to the bottom. Fill the glass with ice cubes. Pour in your cooled tea concentrate, filling the glass about two-thirds of the way. Next, add your milk or creamer. For a classic ratio, use about one part milk to three parts tea, but feel free to adjust to your taste. If you are using a powdered creamer, mix it with a

small amount of warm water first to dissolve it before adding. Finally, if you prefer a sweeter drink, add a splash of simple syrup or your chosen sweetener. Stir everything vigorously to combine. The final touch is to seal the glass with a lid or plastic wrap and give it a good shake. This aerates the drink and creates a light, frothy texture on top.

PRO TIPS FOR ELEVATING YOUR TAIWANESE BOBA MILK TEA

- **Use filtered water for your tea.** The quality of your water directly impacts the taste of your tea. Chlorinated tap water can produce off-flavors.

complement the tea, not overpower it.
