HOW TO USE A GOAL SETTING WORKSHEET EFFECTIVELY

Having the worksheet is only half the battle. To truly benefit, teens need to integrate it into their routine. Here is a step-by-step method that works:

Step 1: Brainstor m Without

Limits

Before filling in the worksheet, encourage the teen to dream freely. On a separate page, have them write down anything they want to do, try, or achieve—no judgment. This could range from “learn to play guitar” to “get a B+ in math” to “make two new friends.” The brainstorming phase fuels the goal-setting process with genuine desire.

Step 2: Pick One Priority Goal

Choice overload can paralyze even adults.

Teens should select one meaningful goal to focus on for the worksheet. **Emphasize that they can always do another worksheet later**—the key is to start with something that truly matters to them, not what a parent or teacher thinks should matter.

Step 3: Make It SMART

will score at least 80% on each quiz and the final exam.”

- **Achievable:** “I have two hours after school daily, and I can dedicate 30 minutes to biology.”
- **Relevant:** “Biology is required for my major, and I want to keep my GPA up.”
- **Time-bound:** “The quarter ends on March 15.”

Step 4: Break It Down

into Action Steps

This is where the worksheet shines. Write down the small, concrete actions needed: “Review notes for 20 minutes each day,” “Ask Mr. Chen for extra practice problems,” “Form a study group with two classmates every Thursday.” Each step should feel doable within a day or week.

Step 5: Identify Obstacles

and Solutions

Teens often give up when they hit a wall. The worksheet should include a section for “What could get in my way?” and “How will I handle it?” For instance, if procrastination is a risk, the solution might be “I will set a phone timer for 25-minute work sprints” or “I will study in the library, not my room.”

Step 6: Schedule Regular

Check-Ins

Set a weekly or bi-weekly time (Sunday evening works well) to revisit the worksheet. Did the teen complete the steps? What’s working? What needs tweaking? This is not about judgment—it is about staying flexible. **Adjusting the plan is a sign of maturity, not failure.**

REAL-LIFE EXAMPLES OF TEEN GOAL SETTING WORKSHEETS

Academic

Goal:

“Raise My History Grade”

Goal:

“Run a 5K”

- **Goal:** Complete a local 5K race in under 30 minutes, 12 weeks from now.
- **Action steps:** Follow a couch-to-5K app three times per week, stretch for

10 minutes after each run, and drink water instead of soda on run days.

- **Resources:** Running buddy (a friend from school), good running shoes, and a playlist of favorite songs.
- **Milestone:** Run 2 miles without stopping by week 6.

Personal Development Goal: “Reduce

Screen Time”

- **Goal:** Limit recreational phone use to 1 hour per day for one month.
- **Action steps:** Use a screen-time tracker app, keep the phone in another room during homework, replace scrolling with reading or drawing.
- **Obstacles:** Boredom during breaks → Solution: Keep a book or sketchpad on the desk.
- **Reward:** If the goal is met for 25 out of 30 days, buy a new board

game to play
with friends.

TIPS FOR PARENTS, TEACHERS, AND MENTORS

If you are helping a teenager use a goal setting worksheet, your role is that of a coach, not a taskmaster. Here are best practices:

- **Let the teen own the goal.** Even if you think “join the debate team” is more valuable than “learn to edit TikTok videos,” resist the urge to steer. Motivation comes from personal interest.
- **Ask open-ended questions.** Instead of “Did you write down your steps?” try “What part of your plan feels most exciting? What feels tricky?”
- **Celebrate effort, not just outcome.** If the teen stuck with the worksheet for three weeks but didn’t hit the target, praise the consistency and help them adjust.
- **Model goal setting yourself.** Show your own worksheet or share a goal you’re working on. Teens learn more from what they see than what they’re told.
- **Print multiple copies.** Keep a stack of blank goal setting worksheets for

teenagers handy. Once the habit forms, they'll reach for one automatically for any new ambition.

Add a "small wins" column—every tiny step counts.

Comparing goals with peers

Remind teens that goals are personal; a "C to B" is just as worthy as someone else's "valedictorian."

COMMON PITFALLS AND HOW TO OVERCOME THEM

Pitfall	Solution
Setting too many goals at once	Limit to one or two goals per worksheet. More can wait for the next sheet.
