- **Legume-derived spices:** Spices like cumin, coriander, fenugreek, and mustard seeds are avoided because they come from plants in the legume family.
- **Alcohol and coffee:** Both can irritate the gut lining and disrupt sleep, which is critical for immune regulation.
- **Seed-based spices:** Fennel, poppy seeds, sesame seeds, and others are excluded.

How AIP Works: Elimination and Reintroduction
