Question 3 (General Knowledge): The prefix "brady-" in medical terminology means:

A) Fast

B) Slow

C) Painful

D) Difficult

Explanation: The correct answer is B. "Brady-" means slow, as in bradycardia (slow heart rate) or bradypnea (slow breathing).

TIPS FOR TEST DAY SUCCESS
