The relationship may feel more like a business arrangement than a partnership. This pattern, while less chaotic than the former, still stems from a place of fear—the fear of being caught off guard by another painful loss.

NAVIGATING SELF-WORTH AND IDENTITY IN RELATIONSHIPS
