to access outside of traditional cable. Direct TV Stream is frequently the best streaming option for Bally Sports. For the NFL, you can watch the Cardinals on local Fox or CBS when they play away games, and on national networks for prime-time slots. "Frontline." For families with young children, the **TV guide for Phoenix AZ** on KAET is a safe and enriching place. Programs like "Sesame Street," "Daniel Tiger's Neighborhood," and "Wild Kratts" air consistently, often with a dedicated children's block from morning until early afternoon.
