Developed and maintained by the National Athletic Trainers' Association (NATA) in collaboration with the Commission on Accreditation of Athletic Training Education (CAATE), these competencies establish the minimum educational standards for the profession.

These competencies are not static. They are reviewed and revised periodically to reflect advancements in sports medicine, changes in healthcare delivery, and emerging research. The most recent edition, the 2020 Athletic Training Educational Competencies, represents a significant shift toward a competency-based education model that emphasizes clinical integration, interprofessional practice, and patient-centered care.

By defining what every athletic trainer should know and be able to do, the competencies ensure consistency across programs while allowing flexibility for institutional innovation. They serve as the foundation for curriculum design, clinical education, and board certification examination content.

THE EVOLUTION OF ATHLETIC TRAINING EDUCATION

From Apprenticeship to Academic Rigor

THE FIVE DOMAINS OF ATHLETIC TRAINING PRACTICE

- **Risk Reduction, Wellness, and Health Literacy:** This domain focuses on identifying risks, promoting healthy lifestyles, and empowering patients to make informed health decisions.
- **Examination, Assessment, and Diagnosis:** This domain

covers the systematic process of evaluating patients and formulating differential diagnoses.

- **Critical Incident Management:** This domain addresses preparation for and response to emergencies, including sudden cardiac arrest, catastrophic injuries, and environmental emergencies.
- **Therapeutic Intervention:** This domain encompasses the full range of treatments aimed at restoring function, reducing pain, and facilitating recovery.
- **Health Care Administration and Professional Responsibility:** This domain includes the operational, legal, and ethical aspects of athletic training practice.

Each domain contains specific competencies that students must master, ranging from foundational knowledge to advanced clinical skills. The domains are not isolated; they intersect and reinforce one another, reflecting the integrated nature of athletic training practice.

FOUNDATIONAL BEHAVIORS OF PROFESSIONAL PRACTICE

In addition to technical skills, the competencies emphasize the importance of professional behaviors. These foundational behaviors include:

- **Primacy of the Patient:** Always placing patient safety and well-being at the center of decision-making.
