Dough (5 minutes)

In a large plastic bucket or a large bowl (at least 6-quart capacity), combine 3 cups (720 ml) of lukewarm water, 1.5 tablespoons (20 g) of salt, and 1.5 tablespoons (14 g) of granulated yeast. Stir until the yeast and salt dissolve. Then add 6.5 cups (910 g) of all-purpose flour. Use a sturdy wooden spoon or a Danish dough whisk to mix until all flour is incorporated and no dry patches remain. The dough will be very sticky and wet—that's exactly what you want. Do not knead. Just mix until uniform.

Now cover the container loosely with a lid or plastic wrap, but do not seal it airtight. Let the dough rest at room temperature for 2 hours. During this time, the dough will rise and then collapse slightly. That is normal. After this initial rise, you can refrigerate the covered dough. It is now ready to use, but chilling for at least 3 hours makes the dough easier to handle.

Step 2: Shaping the Loaf (less than 5 minutes)

When you are ready to bake, dust your hands and the dough surface with flour. Pull up about 1 pound (a grapefruit-sized portion) of dough. Gently shape it into a ball by tucking the edges under. The goal is to create surface tension without deflating all the air pockets. Place the shaped loaf on a piece of parchment paper dusted with cornmeal or flour. Let

it rest uncovered for 40 minutes (or up to 90 minutes if the dough is cold). During this rest, the loaf will spread slightly and rise.

Step 3: Preheat and Prepare the Oven

Place a covered Dutch oven (or a heavy oven-safe pot with a lid) in the oven and preheat to 450°F (230°C) for at least 30 minutes. The pot must be blazing hot. This step mimics a steam-injected professional oven and creates that spectacular crust.

Step 4: Bake (5 minutes active, then passive)

Using oven mitts, carefully remove the hot pot from the oven. Lift the parchment paper with the dough and lower it into the pot. Cover with the lid and bake for 30 minutes. Then remove the lid and bake for another 10-15 minutes until the crust is deep golden brown. The internal temperature should read around 200°F. Transfer the loaf to a wire rack and let cool completely before slicing—this is crucial for the crumb structure. That's it. - **Don't skip the rest after shaping:** That 40-minute bench rest allows the gluten to relax and the loaf to puff slightly. If you bake immediately, the bread will be denser.
- **Experiment with the refrigerator:** The longer the dough sits in the fridge (up to two weeks), the more tangy and complex the flavor becomes. Day-old dough produces a milder loaf; day-five dough is wonderfully sour.
- **Add steam alternatives:** If you don't have a Dutch oven, you can place a pan of hot water on the bottom oven rack and spritz the oven walls with water when you put in the loaf. This creates steam, though results may vary.

VARIATIONS TO KEEP YOUR BREAD INTERESTING

Herb and Garlic Artisan Bread

Add 2 teaspoons of dried rosemary, 1 teaspoon of dried thyme, and 4 minced garlic cloves to the dry ingredients. The herbs infuse the bread with a savory aroma that pairs beautifully with olive oil for dipping.

Whole Wheat

Substitute up to 3 cups of whole wheat flour for an equal amount of all-purpose flour. Add an extra 1/4 cup of water because whole wheat absorbs more moisture. The result is a denser, nuttier loaf packed with fiber.

Cheese and Jalapeño Bread

Fold 1 cup of shredded sharp cheddar and 2 finely chopped jalapeños (seeds removed for less heat) into the dough after the initial 2-hour rise. This variation is perfect for sandwiches or alongside chili.

Olive and Sun-Dried Tomato Bread

During shaping, gently incorporate 1/2 cup of chopped Kalamata olives and 1/3 cup of chopped oil-packed sun-dried tomatoes. This Mediterranean-style bread is excellent toasted with butter.

HOW TO STORE AND REFRESH YOUR ARTISAN BREAD

Homemade artisan bread lacks the preservatives of store-bought loaves, so it can stale by the next day. But you can extend its life. Store the cooled loaf cut-side down on a wooden cutting board, wrapped loosely in a kitchen towel. Avoid plastic bags, which soften the crust. For longer storage, slice the bread and freeze it in a zip-top bag. To revive a

stale loaf, run the crust under cold water, then reheat in a 350°F oven for 5-7 minutes. The water turns to steam, restoring the crisp crust and soft interior.
