Turbocharged swaps like the 2.3L EcoBoost from the Focus RS deliver over 350 horsepower from the factory. This kind of power transforms the driving experience, making highway merges effortless and corners feel exhilarating.

For a few thousand dollars, you can build a vehicle that outperforms many modern hot hatches. Additionally, insurance costs for a modified Focus are often lower than those for a factory performance car. Many owners find that swapping an engine into their existing Focus is not only more satisfying but also more economical than buying a newer, sportier model.

Your specific goal will dictate the engine and supporting modifications. Popular swap objectives include:

- **More power for daily driving:** A naturally aspirated 2.5L Duratec swap offers more low-end torque without complex turbo plumbing.
- **Track or autocross performance:** High-revving engines like the 2.0L Duratec (ST170) or a lightened 1.8L Zetec with ITBs

can be ideal.

- **Reliability and longevity:**

Swapping in a later model engine with fewer miles and modern oil control can extend the life of your Focus.

- **Turbo or supercharger conversion:**

Using a factory turbo engine (EcoBoost) simplifies the process versus adding forced induction to a naturally aspirated motor.

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## LEGAL AND TECHNICAL CONSIDERATIONS BEFORE STARTING

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An engine swap is not just a mechanical project; it also involves

bureaucratic and technical hurdles that must be addressed early on. Overlooking these can lead to failed inspections, wiring nightmares, or even unsafe vehicles.

## Emissions and Regulations

In many regions, swapping an engine requires it to be of the same year or newer than the chassis, and all emissions equipment (catalytic converters, EGR, PCV, etc.) must remain functional. The **Ford Focus engine swap guide** you follow should include a section on local laws.

For example, in California, you must use a CARB-approved engine or ensure the swapped motor retains all factory emission controls. Always check with your state's Department of Motor Vehicles or equivalent authority. Some shops specialize in passing emissions with custom tunes, but that can be costly.

## ECU and Wiring Compatibility

Modern Ford Focus models (especially after 2005) have complex CAN-bus electrical systems. Swapping a different engine may require

using the donor car's ECU and wiring harness, along with immobilizer deletion or reprogramming. For earlier Focus models (1998–2007), using a standalone ECU like Megasquirt or Haltech can simplify the process because you can bypass many factory systems. However, for EcoBoost swaps, you often need the full engine harness, ECU, and in some cases the BCM. Many enthusiasts opt to have a custom wiring harness made or purchase a plug-and-play adapter.

## Drivetrain Matching

The Focus offers both manual (MTX-75, IB5, etc.) and automatic transmissions. The transmission bellhousing pattern must match the new engine. For example, the 2.3L and 2.5L Duratec engines share the same bolt pattern as the 2.0L Duratec, making them a direct fit for the MTX-75 transmission. EcoBoost engines have a different pattern and often require a transmission from the Focus ST or an adapter plate. Axles and half-shafts may also need upgrading to handle increased torque. A common upgrade is swapping to Focus ST or aftermarket axles.

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## POPULAR FORD FOCUS ENGINE SWAP OPTIONS

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Choosing the right engine is the centerpiece of your project. Here are the most common swaps, ranked roughly from least to most complex.

### The 2.0L Duratec (ST170 / Focus ST) Swap

If your Focus originally came with a Zetec or a Duratec, upgrading to the 2.0L Duratec from the European Focus ST170 or the US Focus ST (2008–2011) is a logical step. This engine produces

170–172 horsepower naturally aspirated and features variable valve timing on both intake and exhaust. It offers a broad powerband and revs eagerly to 7,000 rpm. The swap is relatively straightforward because the engine uses the same block architecture and mounting points. You'll need the ST170 intake manifold, throttle body, and ECU or a standalone tune. This is an excellent mid-level power upgrade that doesn't require major fabrication.

### The 2.3L Duratec (Mazda /

# Mustang) Swap

Found in the Mazda 3, Mazda 6, and Ford Ranger (later models), the 2.3L Duratec (also known as the MZR) is a favorite due to its availability and 2.3-liter displacement. With a mild tune, it makes around 200 horsepower. The swap requires the same motor mounts and transmission as the 2.0L Duratec, making it a true “drop-in” if you source the complete engine and harness. Some owners opt for the 2.3L from the Focus ST (non-turbo version) or a later Ford Fusion. The increased displacement gives excellent mid-range torque, making the car feel much quicker

without forced induction.

## The EcoBoost 2.0L (ST / RS) Swap – A Modern Powerhou se

The 2.0L EcoBoost from the 2012–2018 Focus ST is one of the most popular swaps for those seeking serious power. It produces 252 horsepower stock and 270 lb-ft of torque. With a bigger intercooler, downpipe, and a custom tune,

300+ horsepower is easily achievable. The 2016-2018 Focus RS uses a 2.3L EcoBoost with 350 horsepower. Both engines require the matching transmission (usually the ST's MMT6 manual) because the bellhousing pattern is unique to the EcoBoost family. The swap involves extensive wiring; many owners use the entire engine harness and ECU from the donor car, along with the immobilizer and key system. You will also need the ST's cooling system and fuel pump to support higher flow rates. This is a complex swap best suited for experienced builders or shops.

## The 2.5L

## Duratec (Volvo / Mazda) – Budget Torque

Another excellent option is the 2.5L Duratec from the Volvo C30, S40, or Mazda 3 2.5L. This engine is essentially a stretched version of the 2.3L with a longer stroke, producing around 200-230 horsepower and over 200 lb-ft of torque. It has a cast iron block (unlike the 2.0L and 2.3L which are aluminum) for added strength, and it weighs only slightly more. The 2.5L bolts up to the MTX-75 transmission, but you

may need to notch the frame rail for clearance of the larger crank pulley. Many budget-minded swappers choose this route because the engine can be found for under \$500 at a junkyard. With a tune, you can reach 240+ horsepower naturally aspirated and even more with a turbo kit.

## The 1.8L Zetec – A Solid Drop-in for Older Models

If you own a 1998–2004 Focus and want a simple upgrade,

consider the 1.8L Zetec from the European Focus Zetec or the Ford Escort. It produces around 130 horsepower, which doesn't sound huge, but it revs freely and is very light. The 1.8L Zetec shares the same bellhousing and mounts with the 2.0L Zetec, making it a direct swap. This option is particularly popular for track cars because of its lower weight and compatibility with ITBs (individual throttle bodies). While not a power monster, the 1.8L can be a great foundation for a budget race car.
