For ear care, a gentle, vet-recommended ear cleaner and cotton balls are sufficient; avoid cotton swabs inserted into the canal.

ESTABLISHING A STRESS-FREE BRUSHING ROUTINE

common cause of resistance. Use a sprayer or a cup to wet the coat thoroughly, starting from the back and working downward, avoiding the face until the very end.

The Washing and Rinsing Process

If you do accidentally cut the quick, do not panic. Apply styptic powder or cornstarch to the tip of the nail to stop the bleeding.

Building Confidence

Start by simply handling your dog's paws regularly, rewarding them for allowing you to touch their feet. Introduce the clippers without cutting, letting your dog sniff them and associating them with treats. Trim just one nail per session at first, gradually increasing the number as your dog becomes more comfortable. A

grinder can be a less intimidating alternative for many dogs, as it files the nail down slowly and reduces the risk of splitting. Consistency is more important than perfection; even a single nail trimmed each day is progress.

EAR AND EYE CARE: THE DETAILS THAT MATTER

Maintaining clean ears and eyes is a crucial element of **dog grooming simplified** that is often overlooked. These areas can be breeding grounds for bacteria and yeast if not checked regularly.

Gentle Ear Cleaning
