
How To Factory Reset Windows 8

UNDERSTANDING FACTORY RESET IN WINDOWS 8

When Should You Use a Factory Reset?

Consider a factory reset if you experience any of the following:

- Persistent system errors or crashes that cannot be resolved through troubleshooting.
- Severe malware or virus infections that resist removal.
- Performance degradation such as extremely slow boot times or freezing.
- Preparing to sell,

donate, or recycle your computer.

- Starting fresh after a major system failure.

It is worth noting that a factory reset is not a cure-all. If your hardware is failing (e.g., a dying hard drive), resetting the software will not fix it. Always rule out hardware issues first.

PREPARING FOR A FACTORY RESET

Preparation is the most critical step. Once you initiate a reset, there is no going back (well, almost). Follow this checklist to ensure a smooth process.

Backup

Your and Important Data License Keys

Even though the "Refresh" option tries to preserve files, the "Reset" option does not. Copy your documents, photos, videos, and any other important files to an external hard drive, USB flash drive, or a cloud service like OneDrive, Google Drive, or Dropbox. Do not forget browser bookmarks, saved passwords, and email archives.

After the reset, you will need to reinstall your applications. Make a list of the software you use regularly and locate the license keys or product codes. This includes Microsoft Office, Adobe products, games, and any specialized tools. Download the installation files in advance if possible.

Gather Software Ensure You Have a

Recovery Drive

Some Windows 8 computers come with a recovery partition, but others require a physical recovery drive. If your computer did not come with a recovery disc or USB, create one now. Go to **Control Panel > Recovery > Create a recovery drive**. This can save you if the system reset fails.

Charge Your Laptop

If you are using a laptop, plug it into a power source. A reset can take anywhere from 30 minutes to

several hours. If the battery dies mid-process, you could corrupt your system.

METHOD 1: HOW TO FACTORY RESET WINDOWS 8 FROM SETTINGS

This is the standard method if you can still boot into Windows normally.

1. **Open PC Settings:** Move your mouse to the upper-right corner of the screen to open the Charms bar. Click **Settings**, then select **Change PC settings** at the bottom.
2. **Navigate to Update and Recovery:** In the PC Settings menu, click on **Update and**

Recovery.3. **Select**

Recovery: On the left side, choose

Recovery. You will see two main options: **Refresh your PC** and **Reset your PC.**

4. **Start the**

Reset: Under "Reset your PC," click the **Get started** button.

5. **Choose the****Reset Option:**

Windows will ask if you want to "Just remove my files" or "Fully clean the drive." The first option is faster and sufficient for most users. The second option is more thorough and secure, taking longer but ensuring data cannot be easily

recovered.

Choose according to your needs.

6. **Confirm and**

Reset: Read the on-screen information carefully. Windows will list everything that will be removed. Click **Reset** to confirm. Your computer will restart and begin the process.

During the process, your computer may restart several times. Do not interrupt it. Once completed, you will be greeted with the initial Windows 8 setup screen, just like a new computer.

METHOD 2: HOW TO FACTORY RESET WINDOWS 8

FROM THE BOOT MENU

MENU

If Windows will not start properly, you can still perform a factory reset using the boot menu. This method is essential when your system is completely unresponsive.

1. **Access Advanced Startup:** Turn on your computer and wait for the manufacturer's logo. As soon as the logo appears, press and hold the **Power button** to force a shutdown. Repeat this two more times. On the third restart, Windows will display a blue screen with options. This is the **Automatic Repair** screen.

Troubleshoot:

On the blue screen, click

Advanced options.

3. **Select Troubleshoot:**

Next, click on

Troubleshoot.

4. **Choose Reset your PC:** You will see the familiar **Reset your PC** option. Click it.

5. **Follow the Prompts:** Just like in Method 1, choose whether to remove files or fully clean the drive, then confirm the reset. The process will proceed without needing to boot into Windows.

Alternatively, if you have a recovery drive or Windows installation

USB, you can boot from it. Press the appropriate key (usually F2, F12, Del, or Esc) during startup to enter the boot menu. Select your USB or DVD, and when the Windows Setup screen appears, click **Repair your computer** at the bottom-left. This will bring you to the same **Troubleshoot** menu.

METHOD 3: USING THE WINDOWS 8 INSTALLATION MEDIA

For those who have lost the recovery partition or cannot access the boot menu, a Windows 8 installation disc or USB is a lifesaver. This method essentially reinstalls Windows from scratch.

1. Insert the Installation

Media: Plug in your Windows 8 USB or insert the DVD.

2. **Boot from the Media:** Restart your computer and boot from the media (change the boot order in BIOS if necessary).
3. **Start the Installation:** On the first screen, set your language and click **Install now**.
4. **Custom Install:** When asked for the type of installation, choose **Custom: Install Windows only (advanced)**.
5. **Delete Partitions (Optional but Recommended)**
: You will see a

list of partitions. To ensure a truly clean factory reset, delete all partitions until only

Unallocated Space remains. Be extremely careful—this erases

everything on the drive with no recovery. If you are unsure, stop here.

6. **Install on Unallocated Space:** Select the unallocated space and click **Next**. Windows will create necessary partitions and install a fresh copy. The process may take an hour or more, depending on your hardware.

After installation, you will need to go through the initial setup, including entering your Windows product key. This method is the most thorough and is often recommended for deep-seated system issues.

TROUBLESHOOTING COMMON RESET ISSUES

Sometimes, even a straightforward factory reset hits a snag. Here are common problems and their solutions.

"There was a problem resetting

your PC"

This error usually indicates corrupted system files or a faulty recovery partition. Try the following:

- **Run System File Checker:**
Open Command Prompt as Administrator and type `sfc /scannow`. Let it repair any issues, then try the reset again.
- **Use a Recovery Drive:** If the recovery partition is damaged, boot from a recovery USB and choose **Troubleshoot > Reset your PC** from there.
- **Perform a Clean Install:**
As a last resort, use the

installation
media method
described above.

Computer Stuck at "Preparing to Reset"

If the process seems stuck for more than an hour, force a shutdown by holding the power button. Restart and try the reset from the boot menu (Method 2). If it fails again, the hard drive may be failing. Check its health using `chkdsk` or a third-party tool.

Missing Recovery Partition

Many budget PCs lack a recovery partition. In this case, you must use the installation media method. Download the Windows 8 ISO file from Microsoft's website (you may need a valid product key) and create bootable media using the Windows Media Creation Tool.

WHAT TO DO AFTER THE FACTORY RESET

Congratulations! Your Windows 8 system is now pristine. To set yourself up for success, follow these post-reset steps:

- **Install**

Updates:

Windows 8 is no longer officially supported by Microsoft, but you should still install any available security updates. Go to

Settings > Update and Recovery > Windows Update.

- **Reinstall Essential Software:** Start with your web browser, antivirus, and drivers. Visit the manufacturer's website for the latest drivers, especially for network adapters and graphics cards.
- **Restore Your Files:** Copy your backed-up data back to the

computer. Be cautious about opening old files that might have carried malware.

- **Create a Recovery**

Drive:

Immediately create a recovery drive for future emergencies. It only takes a few minutes.

- **Consider Upgrading:**

Since Windows 8 is out of support, think about upgrading to Windows 10 or 11 if your hardware allows. It provides better security and compatibility with modern software.
