- **Plan your whites:** Before you paint, decide which areas will remain pure white paper. Mask them or carefully paint around them. In a **Milind Mulick watercolor**, these reserved whites are the highlights that give the painting its spark.
- **Embrace accidents:** Not every bloom or run will ruin a painting. Often, these "mistakes" can be incorporated into the texture of a tree trunk, a shadow, or a reflection. Learn to adapt.
