

# What Is The The Little Prince About

## The Baobabs

The baobab trees on the Little Prince’s asteroid threaten to overgrow and destroy the planet if not uprooted early. They symbolize the small problems or bad habits that, if ignored, can become destructive. This teaches the importance of discipline and early intervention.

## The Lamplighter

Among the adult characters, the lamplighter is portrayed sympathetically. He follows his orders faithfully, lighting and extinguishing his lamp every minute because his planet spins so fast. He represents the drudgery of work without purpose, yet also loyalty and dedication. The Little Prince admires him because he is the only adult who thinks of something other than himself.

## The Snake

Snakes often symbolize death or danger, and in this story, the snake offers a way for the Little Prince to return to his planet. The snake is enigmatic: it speaks in riddles and claims to have “more power than the finger of a king.” It represents a necessary, albeit painful, transition.

### WHY THE LITTLE PRINCE APPEALS TO ALL AGES
