Daenerys's stay in Qarth is a stark contrast to the wars in Westeros. She must navigate a city of sorcerers, merchants,

and conspirators while trying to build an army. Her dragons are growing, but they are still vulnerable. The House of the Undying sequence is one of the most surreal and important in the entire series, filled with visions that hint at future events—though Martin never explains them fully. To **read A Clash of Kings** is to watch Daenerys transform from a queen of promises to a queen of fire. But she also makes mistakes, and her decisions in this book have consequences that ripple through the rest of the saga.

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### WRITING STYLE AND STRUCTURE: WHY IT WORKS
