WHAT IS THE CIRCULATORY

SYSTEM?

Pathway of Blood Through the Heart

A classic worksheet prompt asks: "Trace the path of a red blood cell from the vena cava to the aorta." The correct answer follows this sequence:

1. Deoxygenated blood enters the right atrium via the superior or inferior vena cava.
2. Blood flows through the tricuspid valve into the right ventricle.
3. The right ventricle pumps blood through the pulmonary valve into the pulmonary artery.

4. Blood travels to the lungs, where it picks up oxygen and releases carbon dioxide.
5. Oxygenated blood returns to the left atrium via the pulmonary veins.
6. Blood flows through the mitral valve into the left ventricle.
7. The left ventricle pumps blood through the aortic valve into the aorta.
8. From the aorta, blood is distributed to the rest of the body.

BLOOD VESSELS AND THEIR CHARACTERISTICS

THE ROLE OF BLOOD

COMPONENTS

COMMON DISORDERS OF THE CIRCULATORY SYSTEM

- **Anemia:** A condition in which the blood lacks enough healthy red blood cells to carry adequate oxygen to tissues.

A worksheet might ask: "What is the leading cause of heart attacks?" The answer is coronary artery disease, usually resulting from atherosclerosis. Another question could be: "How can lifestyle choices affect circulatory health?" Answers should include diet, exercise, smoking cessation, and stress management.

TIPS FOR COMPLETING A CIRCULATORY SYSTEM WORKSHEET

Memorize the Pathway Step by Step

Practice with Diagrams

Labeling blank diagrams repeatedly is one of the most effective ways to prepare. Many worksheet answers require identifying structures visually, so being able to recognize the aorta, vena cava, and valves on a diagram is essential.
