Blakely had the difficult task of making the audience believe that Julie could genuinely love both brothers, albeit in different ways. Bixby's performance was a compelling mix of street-smart toughness and genuine affection, and his fate in the story served as a major turning point for Tom's character.

The depth of the cast was astonishing. **Ray Milland**, an Oscar winner, brought regal disdain to the role of Duncan Calderwood, Julie's wealthy father. **Gloria Grahame**, another Oscar winner, was captivating in her final significant role as the faded movie star Sue Prescott, Julie's alcoholic mother. **Kim**

Darby and **Robert Reed** (of **The Brady Bunch** fame) also contributed powerful performances, adding layers of complexity to the sprawling narrative.
