## Current SE Tax Rate Breakdown

- 2.9% for Medicare (no cap)

- Additional 0.9% Medicare surtax on earnings over \$200,000 (single) or \$250,000 (married filing jointly)

Remember that you can deduct the employer-equivalent portion (half of the SE tax) when calculating your adjusted gross income. This deduction is taken on Form 1040, Schedule 1, and it reduces your income tax liability—another reason to keep an accurate worksheet.

## 3. Quarterly Estimated Tax Payments

If you expect to owe at least \$1,000 in tax for the year, the IRS generally requires you to make quarterly estimated payments. A good worksheet includes a section to record each payment date and amount, so you can track your progress and avoid underpayment penalties. Include both income tax and self-employment tax in your estimates.

## 4. Self-Employment Tax Calculation

This part of the worksheet mimics Schedule SE. You multiply your net earnings (gross income minus deductions) by 92.35% to get the amount subject to SE tax. Then apply the 15.3% rate (with the Social Security wage cap considered). The worksheet should also calculate the deductible half of SE tax.

## 5. Summary and Year-End Totals

Finally, a comprehensive worksheet aggregates all income, all deductions, total SE tax owed, and total estimated payments made. This summary is what you'll use to fill out Schedule SE and Schedule C, and it gives you a clear year-end picture.

### HOW TO CREATE YOUR OWN WORKSHEET (STEP-BY-STEP)

While many free and paid templates exist online, building your own customized **Self Employment Tax And Deduction Worksheet** in a spreadsheet program can be highly effective. Here's how to set it up.

### Step 1: Set Up Column Headers for Income

Create columns for Date, Client/Payer, Description, Gross Amount, and Any Withholding. Sum the gross amount at the bottom. This is your total gross self-employment income.

### Step 2: Create a Deduction Log

Create a separate sheet or section with columns for Date, Expense Description, Category (e.g., home office, travel), Receipt Number, and Amount. Organize by category for easier totals. Sum all deductions.

### Step 3: Compute Net Earnings

In a dedicated cell, subtract total deductions from total gross income. This is your net earnings from self-employment. This number will be used in the SE tax calculation.

Use the formula: **Net Earnings × 0.9235 = SE Tax Base**. Then apply the 15.3% rate, with a check against the Social Security wage base. If your SE tax base exceeds the limit, only apply the 12.4% up to that limit and 2.9% on the entire amount.

## Step 5: Track Quarterly Payments

Add rows for each quarter's estimated payment, including date paid, amount, and confirmation number. At year-end, compare total payments with total tax owed to see if you have a balance due or a refund.

## Step 6: Include the Deductible Half

Create a cell that computes 50% of the SE tax (the employer-equivalent portion). This number will be reported on Schedule 1 of your 1040 and reduces your adjusted gross income.

Once your worksheet is set up, update it at least monthly. This habit prevents last-minute scrambling and helps you spot opportunities to reduce your tax liability as the year progresses.

### COMMON MISTAKES WHEN USING A SELF EMPLOYMENT TAX AND DEDUCTION WORKSHEET

Even with a great worksheet, errors can happen. Watch out for these frequent pitfalls.

### Mixing Personal and Business Expenses

Only business expenses are deductible. Using a dedicated business bank account and credit card makes it easier to keep records clean. If you use personal accounts, carefully separate transactions in your worksheet.

Many freelancers forget that they can deduct half of the SE tax from their income. This is a common oversight that leads to overpaying income tax. Ensure your worksheet has a line for this deduction.

Waiting until January to fill in all numbers reduces accuracy and increases stress. Regular updates also help you anticipate quarterly payment amounts.

### Ignoring the Social Security Wage Base

Once your net earnings reach the annual wage base limit, Social Security tax stops for that year. A good worksheet should automatically cap the Social Security portion, but if you calculate manually, you might overpay if you don't check the limit.

Half of that (\$1,554) becomes a deduction. She adds her projected income tax estimate and makes a quarterly payment.

By continuing to update her worksheet throughout the year, she sees her net earnings rise to \$85,000 by December. She computes her total SE tax, compares it with her four quarterly payments, and finds she has a small balance due.
