Each blue bead represents another day the child showed up, faced their fears, and moved forward. For many children, collecting blue beads becomes a way to track progress over time.

Yellow Beads: Radiation Therapy

Yellow beads are commonly used to represent radiation therapy sessions. Yellow is a bright, optimistic color that symbolizes energy, warmth, and hope. Radiation treatments can be intimidating, especially for young children, but the yellow bead reframes the experience as an act of courage. Each yellow bead shines like a small sun, reminding the child that they are getting stronger with every session.

Green Beads: Surgery or Invasive Procedures

Green beads are awarded for surgeries and other invasive medical procedures. Green is associated with growth, renewal, and health—fitting for a procedure intended to heal the body. Surgery can be one of the most challenging parts of a treatment journey, and the green bead honors the bravery it takes to undergo an operation. It also celebrates the recovery that follows.

Purple Beads:

Hospital Admissions and Stays

Purple beads represent overnight hospital stays or extended admissions. Purple is often associated with royalty, dignity, and resilience. For a child, spending days or weeks in a hospital room can feel isolating, but each purple bead acknowledges their strength in enduring that experience. The color also carries a sense of creativity and imagination, reminding children that their spirit remains free even when their body is confined.

Orange Beads: Special Milestones and Celebrations

Orange beads are used for special milestones, such as the end of a treatment phase, a birthday celebrated in the hospital, or a significant personal achievement. Orange is a warm, vibrant color that embodies enthusiasm, joy, and success. These beads are often among the most cherished because they mark moments of triumph—the light at the end of a dark tunnel. They remind the child and their family that the journey includes victories worth celebrating.

Pink Beads: Gifts and Acts of Kindness

Pink beads are typically given to children when they receive a gift, a visit from a special person, or an act of kindness from a staff member or volunteer. Pink represents love, compassion, and tenderness. These beads help children see that they are surrounded by people who care about them, even during difficult times. They reinforce the idea that kindness is a powerful part of healing.

Silver and Gold Beads: Major Milestones

Silver and gold beads are reserved for the most significant milestones in a child's treatment journey. A silver bead might mark the completion of a full cycle of chemotherapy, while a gold bead is often given for completing all treatment and entering survivorship or maintenance. These beads shimmer with meaning, representing the pinnacle of courage and endurance. They are tokens of incredible achievement that children and their families can look back on with immense pride.
