# Fermat's Last Theorem

Pierre de Fermat famously wrote in the margin of a book that he had a proof for his hypothesis, but the margin was too

small to contain it. For 358 years, mathematicians attempted to prove that no three positive integers  $a$ ,  $b$ , and  $c$  satisfy  $a^n + b^n = c^n$  for any integer  $n$  greater than 2. Andrew Wiles finally proved it in 1994, turning one of history's most famous hypotheses into a theorem.
